# Introduction

This handbook is intended to assist race organizers and coaches for the various Intermountain race series. Some information on Western Region FIS races and Intermountain projects is included. The handbook includes Intermountain and USSA rules as they pertain to the different race series, lists various required procedures for races and suggests additional procedures, which may be helpful for race organizers to follow. In addition to this handbook, you should refer the "*Points and Rankings*" and the "*USSA Alpine Competition Regulations*" chapters in the *2004-2005 USSA Alpine Competition Guide*, the *Intermountain Division Text* published on the IMD website and the *USSA Alpine Officials' Manual*.

This handbook also covers the selection procedures for Intermountain quota teams and the Intermountain Championships

The first section of this handbook lists recent Intermountain and USSA rule changes. This is followed by a section that lists procedures common to all Intermountain race series. A separate section follows devoted to the details of each race series. A chapter on selection procedures for quota teams and the Intermountain Championships is also included.

## Recent Rule Changes

### J1-3 Allowed in North- South Series

Reopen the South Series and North Series technical races to J1-3 age classes, allowing athletes to compete in an entry level series that is appropriate to J1-3 classes. These events will remain non-scored. A 250 point minimum cut-off will be enforced. J1-3 will be eliminated from the YSL series.

### Western Junior Championship/Western States Selections

Formerly known as J1-2 Olympics and Western Champs. We will use the new world cup point system and use the best 2 results for each of the four disciplines. Then combine all of the events into one list. There will not be a board as in the past.

### Standardize IMD Selections Procedures

Use the same selection procedure for all IMD events excluding the J4 Festival. Use cumulative world cup points using the best two results in each discipline for which there is a qualifier i.e. Western Junior Championships, Western States= qualify in 4 events, J3 Olympics=qualify in 3 events, J4/5 Champs and Sun Valley Invitational= qualify in 2 events.

### World Cup Point Scoring Clarification

World Cup Points scoring system will use the 100-1 system. In qualifiers where there are more than two races in a single discipline, IMD will use the best two results. In the event that there are only 2 races in a single discipline, IMD will use both results. If there is only one race in a discipline, IMD will use the 1 result and then double it. In the event of tie-breakers, IMD will use the next best result in ANY discipline. If there is still a tie, IMD will use combined race points.

### Divisional Head Coach Incentive

IMD will pay a women's head coach's per-diem and a men's head coach's per-diem for all "independent projects" as a way to encourage coaches to volunteer for this position.

### Head Coach Rotation

The division needs 2 head coaches for the Big Sky DH's, Western Junior Championships, Western States and JIII Olympics. Bogus Basin, Sun Valley, Jackson Hole, Snowbird, Rowmark, Hailey, Park City and McCall will all take one of these positions. Positions will be assigned every year.

### Comped Entries and Lifts

IMD will pay head tax for the top 5 point holders in IMC races. Organizers can choose whether they will comp these entries for the top 5 point holders. Automatic status will no longer be a criteria for comped entries. The IMD Team will receive comped entries and lifts reimbursable by the division.

## Tutor Program

IMD will develop a pool of tutors who we can draw from. IMD will hire a tutor for the Big Sky DH's as a test project.

## Equipment Purchases

IMD will purchase 5 new b-nets, one more radio and batteries and chargers.

## Entry Fees

All scored race entry fees will be raised by \$1.00.

## Tutor Program

IMD will hire a tutor to go on the Big Sky WR FIS Open race.

# Intermountain Team Info

## Coaching Nominations

Coaching nominations for Intermountain Projects must be completed as scheduled:

Dec. 15th for the Big Sky DH.

Feb. 15th for Junior Olympic and Western Champs events.

Teams must notify the IMD office with a list of staff members going to Regional FIS events where IMD is not travelling as a team at least three weeks prior to the events. All coordination of entries and on the hill coordination requires this information.

## J1-2 Olympics — Western Championships

The Junior Olympic and Western Championships teams will be selected from Intermountain Cup Races. Selections will be based on the World Cup Points scoring system using the 100-1 system. We will use the best two results for each of the four disciplines. Then combine all of the events into one list.

## Intermountain Divisional Projects and Independent Projects

Intermountain Teams sent to Western Region projects will be coordinated through the Intermountain Office. These projects include the Western Junior Championships, Western States, JIII Olympics, JIV Festival and the Big Sky Downhills. These projects will have coordinated lodging, transportation, staff, etc.

Intermountain has designated the remaining Western Region races where lodging and transportation will be coordinated by individual clubs. These "Independent" projects are: Mammoth WR FIS, Tech Series, Snowking WR Elite, Mt. Hood Meadows WR FIS, Far West WR FIS and Spring Series. The IMD office will coordinate entries and will name a staff and

head coach per gender for the Independent projects. Western Region will coordinate the Topolino shootout and JII Nationals.

## Head Coaches for IMD Projects

IMD will pay Head coaches per diems for all Head Coaches on the “Independent Projects”. The division will require teams (Bogus Basin, Sun Valley, Jackson Hole, Snowbird, Rowmark, Hailey, Park City and McCall) to volunteer a men or women’s Head Coach for the following events: Big Sky DH’s, Western Junior Championships, Western State Championships and JIII Olympics. Coaches will be assigned on a first come first serve basis.

## Selection and Payment of Intermountain Team Projects

Lists for Intermountain Team projects will be completed two weeks prior to the event whenever possible. Coaches need to confirm their athletes and athletes need to send payment at least one week prior to the event. If an athlete has not paid project expenses prior to the first Team Captains meeting for the event, the athlete may be pulled from the race. Athletes who are selected as alternates within the one-week period must make every effort to get the payment to the IMD office ASAP. IMD will accept: money orders, personal checks or athletes may pay with Paypal. # Elements Common to all Races

## Race Announcement

A race announcement should be sent to all Intermountain Clubs approximately three weeks prior to the race. The race TD, the Intermountain Office, the Northern Office and the ACC Chairman should also receive copies of the announcement.

The race announcement should include information on the event — number of races, discipline, and training dates for Downhill and Super G, start times and data on the course that will be used. The entry deadline, the address and phone number for entries, the series entry fee, and information on the format for entries — phone entries, team rosters by FAX, e-mail, or mail — should be included. The names, addresses and phone numbers of the TD and the Chief of Race should be listed along with the time and location of the first Team Captains meeting. All Team Captain's meetings must not be scheduled prior to 7:30 pm to allow for travel time. The location and time for awards, relative to the end of each day's race, should be included.

## Entries and Entry Fees

USSA and Intermountain rules limit participation in Intermountain races. Participants must meet membership and license requirements established by the division and the national organization as well as age and other requirements established by the division for each race series. Details are included in the section for each race series. Organizers may be responsible for the membership and license fees of any unlicensed participants in their race.

Except for the eight boys and six girls that Northern is allowed to enter in Intermountain Cup and JO Series races, all out-of-division racers must be check with the Intermountain Office prior to entering.

Intermountain establishes maximum entry fees for each race series, which organizers may not exceed. Members of the Intermountain Junior Alpine Team are not subject to entry fees and receive free lift passes for Intermountain Cup races. The Intermountain Division is responsible for the entries and lifts for the Intermountain Junior Alpine Team. Intermountain will reimburse organizers head tax for athletes they choose to comp that are one of the top 5 point holders in the race. It is up to each individual organizer whether or not they will comp the top 5 point holders in an IMC race.

## The Organizing Committee and the Jury

The *USSA Alpine Competition Regulations* describe the responsibilities of the Organizing Committee and the Jury in section 2.1. Additional information is available in the *USSA Alpine Officials Manual*.

In addition to forming the Race Committee, it is the responsibility of the race organizer to supply certain officials — the Chief of Race, Chief of Course, Chief of Timing and Calculations, Race Administrator, the Start and Finish Referees and forerunners. The Intermountain Alpine Officials Chairman appoints the TD. The Referee and (for speed events) the Assistant Referee are appointed by the TD at the Team Captains meeting, normally from the coaches present for the race. USSA rules and the terms of the USSA liability insurance policy require that all of these officials and the course setters be members of USSA or of another National Ski Federation recognized by the FIS. Additionally, Intermountain rules require that the Referee, Assistant Referee and course setters have a USSA Professional Coach license. Under USSA rules, all

coaches must have a Professional Coach license for course access and in order to be eligible for a complimentary coach's pass. A list of Intermountain members meeting these requirements will be sent to you along with the roster of licensed racers.

The organizer is also responsible for supplying forerunners (who must be USSA members) for the race (USSAICR section 2.1.6), the start and finish officials (USSAICR 2.2.2), and an adequate number of qualified Gate Judges (USSAICR 2.7).

## **Course Setters**

Course setters are nominated by the Team Captains and appointed by the Jury. USSA and Intermountain rules require that course setters be USSA Professional Coach members. This applies to course setters of the race organizer as well as those from visiting programs. Qualified coaches from out-of-division teams participating in Intermountain races are normally offered the opportunity to set, provided that they are also willing to assist with Jury duties.

## **Coaches' Passes**

The race organizer is required to supply complimentary lift passes to the licensed coaches of registered Intermountain teams and visiting out-of-division teams. The organizer may place reasonable limits on the number of coaches per team by noting the limits in the race announcement. At minimum, the organizer should meet the Western Region quota of one coach per gender plus one additional coach for each ten racers or portion thereof. (A team with a single racer would be allowed two coaches, a team with one boy and one girl would be allowed three coaches, a team with 11 total boys and girls would be allowed four coaches, etc.)

The organizer has no obligation to supply passes to, or allow course access by, persons who do not appear on the roster of licensed coaches valid for the race, unless they are licensed coaches of visiting out-of-division teams. Coaches may be asked to present their USSA card at the Team Captain's meeting.

## **Race Packets**

Race Packets will be distributed from the USSA Office about four weeks prior to each race. The race packet will have transmittal sheets, TD Report forms, and all of the other forms you will need to do your race

Additional forms that you may need such as Minutes of the Team Captains meeting, Protests, Jury Decisions, Penalty Calculations, Liability Waiver and Hand Timing are included in the 2004/2005 Master Forms packet that is sent to all race organizers by USSA and that is also available for downloading from the USSA web site ([www.ussa.org](http://www.ussa.org)). Go to the Alpine page and then to the Alpine Officials page to find the forms.

## **Race Results**

USSA supplies Mac-OS, Windows and DOS race results programs that will produce hardcopy results and the SKI-DATA file that must be submitted after your race. Hardcopies of the results and the TD report, both signed by the TD must be mailed to the Intermountain Office within two days of the completion of your race series. The SKI-DATA file for nationally scored races (Intermountain Cup, Open and JO Series) must be e-mailed to ([alpineresults@ussa.org](mailto:alpineresults@ussa.org)), the Intermountain Officials Chairman ([gloyfrap@juno.com](mailto:gloyfrap@juno.com)) and the IMD Director ([cqburnett@ussa-imd.org](mailto:cqburnett@ussa-imd.org)). E-mailing the SKI-DATA file on a daily basis is preferred. For all other Intermountain

races (North and South Series, Intermountain Championships, YSL), the SKI-DATA file is to be sent to the Intermountain Officials Chairman and the Intermountain Director. Electronic "Hard Copy" versions of the results must be e-mailed daily to the Steve Schowengerdt ([gerdt@ussa-imd.org](mailto:gerdt@ussa-imd.org)) for posting on the IMD web site.

Results must include the names of the Jury, the course data including start and finish elevations and vertical drop, number of gates for each run and the course setters. For Downhill and Super G, which must be run on homologated or registered courses, the FIS or USSA homologation or registration number must be included along with the measured (gate to gate) course length. Racer code numbers are required, and DNFs, DNSs and DSQs must be shown. The year-of-birth of each racer is requested on all USSA results. Results must be signed by the TD. Minutes of protest meetings must be signed by each jury member.

A timing technical report form must be completed for each scored competition and submitted with the results to USSA.

Two copies of the results (signed by the TD), the USSA TD Report, the Race Transmittal Sheet (signed by the TD), and the appropriate headtax must be sent to Carma Burnett Carew at the Intermountain Office.

## Headtax

All Intermountain races, except for Masters and Collegiate are subject to head tax. The headtax is based on the number of competitors who start in each race. First run DNSs are not taxed (if they are not charged entry fees). All DNFs, DSQs and second run DNSs are taxed.

Intermountain Cup, Open and JO Series races are nationally scored and are subject to USSA, Intermountain and Western Region headtaxes. For 2004-2005 headtaxes for the various race series are:

Three separate checks for the USSA, Western Region and Intermountain headtax need to be submitted to the Intermountain Office ( IMD headtax) and the USSA Office (WR and USSA headtax) along with the results.

## Helmets

All competitors in downhill, Giant Slalom and Super G races and training runs must wear helmets "manufactured for ski racing".

Competitors in all YSL races (including Slaloms) must wear helmets as described above. "Slalom" helmets are not acceptable in any Intermountain YSL race.

# The Intermountain Cup J1-J2 Qualifying Series

The races in this series are nationally scored and are seeded on the basis of the USSA Points List valid for the race. World Cup points, awarded to the top 30 finishers in each race are used to determine individual discipline and overall champions for the entire season. World Cup points, awarded to the top 30 Intermountain finishers in the qualifiers are used in the selection process for the Western Junior Championships and Western States. Intermountain will take the best two results from each of the four disciplines. Then combine all of the disciplines to generate one list.

## Entries

Intermountain Cup participants must be USSA members with an Alpine Competitor license.

Intermountain Cups Slalom, Giant Slalom and Super G races are open to all Intermountain A, J1 and J2 competitors. Certain races are designated as qualifiers

J3s are eligible for the Intermountain Cup Soldier Mtn. DH and the Last Chance/Snow Cup.

Northern Division may enter eight boys and six girls in Intermountain Cup races. The entries will be made by the Northern ACC Chairman. These entries do not need to be cleared with the Intermountain Office or ACC Chairman.

Other out-of-division racers, and foreign competitors not on the list of properly licensed competitors must be approved by the Intermountain Office or ACC Chairman.

Intermountain teams are responsible for the license status of the racers they enter in a race. Teams that enter a competitor who does not appear on the USSA Points will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of the racer plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racer participates. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

Race organizers are responsible for the license status of any independent, foreign and out-of-division racers who participate in their races. Race organizers will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of racers who do not appear on the list of properly licensed competitors that is sent to them, plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racers participate. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

## Entry Deadlines

The entry deadline is 72 hours before the first draw, including the draw for the first Downhill training. If an organizer feels there will be too large of a field to handle all entries, the organizer may make the entry deadline 4 days prior to the first Team Captain's meeting. This will ensure that clubs do not bring kids who might not be able to race. The entry deadline must be published in the race announcement. Race organizers may refuse entries from teams and individuals that do not meet the entry deadline. When an organizer accepts a late entry, the racer may be run at the end of their age group.

## Subsidy for IMC DH

Intermountain will pay \$200.00 and give complimentary lifts tickets to 5 women and 5 men who are the 5 lowest point holders for the Soldier Mtn. DH. Athletes who want to be considered for this need to have their coaches submit their names to the IMD office on February 7<sup>th</sup>. The 5 lowest points in men and the 5 lowest points in women will be selected and notified. In the event that someone pulls out, we will not go to the next lowest point holder.

## Entry Fees

Maximum entry fees for Intermountain Cup races have been established by the ACC. For 2004-2005 these fees are:

Downhill *	\$29.00/ race
Slalom, and Giant Slalom	\$27.00/ race
Super G †	\$27.00/ race
* an additional \$30 training fee may be applied for Downhill	
† and additional \$10 training fee may be applied for Super G	

The IMD Junior Team will be named after the FIS Elite Tech events and Speed Events. The team will receive complimentary entries and lifts to Intermountain Cup races for the remainder of the season and in the next season until a new team is named.

Organizers will be compensated for lift passes and entries for the Alpine Junior Team. To receive compensation, the organizer must submit a statement listing the comp competitors and the cost of their lift passes and entries to the Intermountain Office along with the race results. Organizers are required to make full entry refunds to racers who are removed from the ranking board prior to the draw. Refunds for racers who are on the start order but do not start, are at the discretion of the organizer. In general, where a team has made a conscientious effort to make a correct entry, the organizer should only charge for racers who actually start. Organizers who intend not to make refunds for DNSs should indicate this in their race announcement. If an organizer does not refund the entry fees of first run DNSs, then headtax must be paid on these racers.

## Headtax

These races are subject to a \$5.00 USSA headtax, a \$2.00 Western Region headtax and a \$5.00 Intermountain headtax.

## Team Captains Meetings

The organizer should schedule Team Captains meetings at 7:30pm to allow for travel. Teams that are unable to attend a Team Captains meeting for any reason should arrange to be represented by someone who will be at the meeting. It is the responsibility of all teams and independent racers to be aware of the decisions that are made at the meetings.

USSA rules require that all racers be represented at all Team Captains meetings. The organizer should call the roll at every meeting and exclude any unrepresented racers from training and racing.

## **Start Order**

Intermountain Cup races are seeded on the basis of the current USSA Points List.

## **Penalty Calculation**

IMC Series races are seeded on USSA points, they are nationally scored races and the penalty must be calculated using the USSA points list. It is the responsibility of the race organizer to remind the Technical Delegate that the computer generated penalty calculation needs to be checked manually against the valid USSA points list.

## **Intermountain Cup Points**

Intermountain Cup points are awarded to the top 30 finishers in each IMC race. Please refer to the World Cup points scoring system described in the 2005 Alpine Competition Guide. All participants in the races regardless of class or divisional affiliation earn points provided they are properly licensed at the time of the race.

The points are used for naming combined and individual discipline winners at the end of the season.

## **J1-J2 World Cup Points**

World Cup points are awarded to the top 30 Intermountain J1-J2 competitors in each IMC race provided they are properly licensed at the time of the race. These points are used to create the selection list used to select the team for the Western Junior Championships and Western States. Racers must have returned a *Western Region and Intermountain Division Medical Release* and an *Intermountain Team Agreement* and be registered for the FIS list (or for a reserved FIS number) prior to a race in order to earn World Cup points in the race.

IMD will use the World Cup Points scoring 100-1 system. In qualifiers where there are more than two races in a single discipline, IMD will use the best two results. In the event that there are only 2 races in a single discipline, IMD will use both results. If there is only one race in a discipline, IMD will use the 1 result and then double it. In the event of tie-breakers, IMD will use the next best result in ANY discipline. If there is still a tie, IMD will use combined race points. The points will then be combined together to form one list

## **Trophies**

A single set of trophies (1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> place) is required for Intermountain Cup races. If the organizer desires, separate trophies for A and J2 skiers may be awarded.

## **Intermountain Alpine Junior Team**

A team comprised of six men and four women from IMD will be named to the IMD Alpine junior Team. This team will be selected from the Western Region Park City Elite FIS races and the Western Region Big Sky FIS races. The IMD Alpine Junior Team will receive free entries and lifts to all IMC races for the remainder of the season and the beginning of the next season until a new team is named.

## The J3 Qualifying Race Series

The races in this series are nationally scored and are seeded on the basis of the USSA Points List valid for the race. World Cup points, awarded to the top 30 Intermountain J3 finishers in each race, are used in the selection of the J3 Olympics team. . Intermountain will take the best two results from each of the three disciplines. Then combine all of the disciplines to generate one list.

### Course Requirements

The USSA Alpine Competition Regulations specify course standards for races that are open to all J3 competitors. These standards are:

Downhill	450 m max	NA	2000m max
Slalom	160 m max	38 - 60	
Giant Slalom	350 m max	11% to 15% vm	
Super G	280 - 400	8% to 10% vm max	

vm = vertical drop in meters

For GS and Super G, only gates that require a change of direction contribute to the count.

Course data, including course name, start and finish elevations and vertical drop in meters, and gate counts must be included on results for all JO Series races, even when the race is run on a non-homologated trail. The start and finish elevations should be established from topographical maps or lift profiles, not with an altimeter. For Downhills and Super Gs, the actual gate-to-gate length of the course, measured with a wheel or rope, also needs to be included on the results.

### Entries

Participants in JO races must have a USSA Alpine Competitor license. J3 Qualifying races are open to all properly licensed J3 class competitors.

J4s may not apply for authorization to participate in J3 Olympic Series races.

Out-of-division racers and foreign competitors must be approved by the Intermountain Office or ACC Chairman.

Intermountain teams are responsible for the license status of the racers that they enter in a race. Teams that enter a competitor who does not appear on the USSA points will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of the racer plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racer participates. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

Race organizers are responsible for the license status of any independent, foreign and out-of-division racers who participate in their races. Race organizers will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of racers who do not appear on the list of properly licensed competitors that is sent to them, plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racers Participate. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

Race organizers and the Jury are responsible for limiting the participation of J3s on a course that exceeds the USSA J3 course specs

## Entry Deadlines

The entry deadline is 72 hours before the draw, including the draw for the first Super-G training. Race organizers may refuse entries from teams and individuals that do not meet the entry deadline. When a late entry is accepted, the racer may be seeded at the end of their age group.

## Entry Fees

Maximum entry fees for JO Series races have been established by the ACC. For 2004-2005 these fees are:

Slalom and Giant Slalom	\$26.00/ race
Super-G	\$27.00/race

Organizers are required to make full entry refunds to racers who are removed from the board prior to the draw. Refunds for racers who are on the start order but do not start are at the discretion of the organizer. In general, when a team makes a conscientious effort to make a correct entry, the organizer should only charge for racers who start. Organizers who intend not to make refunds for DNS's should indicate this in their race announcement. If an organizer does not refund entry fees of first-run DNS's, then headtax must be paid on these racers.

## Headtax

These races are subject to a \$5.00 USSA headtax, a \$2.00 Western Region headtax and a \$4.00 Intermountain headtax.

## Team Captains Meetings

The organizer should schedule Team Captains meetings at 7:30pm to allow for travel time. Teams that are unable to attend a Team Captains meeting for any reason should arrange to be represented by someone. It is the responsibility of all teams and independent racers to be aware of the decisions made at the meetings.

USSA rules require that all racers be represented at all Team Captains meetings. The organizer should call the roll at every meeting and exclude unrepresented racers from training and racing.

## Penalty Calculation

The penalty must be calculated using USSA points. It is the responsibility of the race organizer to remind the Technical Delegate that the computer-generated penalty calculation needs to be checked manually against the valid USSA points list.

## J3 World Cup Points

World Cup points are awarded to the top 30 in JO Series races. The best two results in each discipline will be used and then combined into one list for selection to Junior Olympics. Racers must have completed and returned a *Western Region and Intermountain Division Medical Release* and an *Intermountain Team Agreement* prior to a race in order to earn World Cup points in the race.

## Trophies

One set of trophies (1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> place) is required for JO Series races.

## The A-J3 Open Race

This race is open to all A-J3 competitors in the North and the South. This race is nationally scored and will be seeded off the USSA points list valid for this race. This race is not used for selections and may have a point cut-off in order to manage the field size.

## Entries

Participants in the "Open" race must have a USSA Alpine Competitor license. The "Open" race is open to all properly licensed A-J1-J2-J3 class competitors.

Entries for out-of-division racers and foreign competitors must be approved by the Intermountain Office or ACC Chairman.

Intermountain teams are responsible for the license status of the racers that they enter in a race. Teams that enter a competitor who does not appear on the USSA Points will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of the racer plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racer participates. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

Race organizers are responsible for the license status of any independent, foreign, and out-of-division racers that participate in their races. Race organizers will be charged for the outstanding USSA and Intermountain fees of racers who do not appear on the list of properly licensed competitors that is sent to them, plus \$20.00 for each race in which the racers participate. These racers will not receive credit for any result that they earn in the race.

## Entry Deadlines

The entry deadline is 3-4 days prior to the first Team captain's meeting due to the possibility of the fields being unmanageable. The deadline will be posted on the race announcement.

Race organizers may refuse entries from teams and individuals that do not meet the entry deadline. When an organizer accepts a late entry, the racer may be seeded at the end of the field.

## Entry Fees

Maximum entry fees for the "Open" race have been established by the ACC. For 2004-2005 these fees are:

Slalom and Giant Slalom	\$26.00/ race
-------------------------	---------------

Organizers are required to make full entry refunds to racers who are removed from the ranking board prior to the draw. Refunds for racers who are on the start order but do not start, are at the discretion of the organizer. In general, where a team has made a conscientious effort to make a correct entry, the organizer should only charge for racers who actually start. Organizers who intend not to make refunds for DNS's should indicate this in their race announcement. If an

organizer does not refund the entry fees of first run DNS's, then headtax must be paid on these racers.

## **Headtax**

These races are subject to a \$5.00 USSA headtax, a \$2.00 Western Region headtax, and a \$4.00 Intermountain headtax.

## **Team Captains Meetings**

The organizer should schedule Team Captains meetings at 7:30 to allow for travel time. Teams that are unable to attend a Team Captains meeting for any reason should arrange to be represented by someone who will be at the meeting. It is the responsibility of all teams and independent racers to be aware of the decisions that are made at the meetings.

USSA rules require that all racers be represented at all Team Captains meetings. The organizer should call the roll at every meeting and exclude any unrepresented racers from training and racing.

## **Penalty Calculation**

The penalty must be calculated using USSA points. It is the responsibility of the race organizer to remind the Technical Delegate that the computer generated penalty calculation needs to be checked manually against the valid USSA points list.

## **Trophies**

One set of trophies are required for the "Open" race.

## **The Topolino Shootout**

To qualify for the Topolino Shootout a racer must have finished in the top 15 overall at the prior year's J3/4 Olympics. Those athletes will be invited to the Shootout in Park City. All athletes will receive World Cup points using the "old system". Each athlete will get 3 runs in slalom and GS. Selections will be based on the best two runs in slalom and the best two runs in GS and then combined together.

## **The North and South Series**

The races in these series are non-scored and are seeded using the TRS (totally random sort) method. These North/South races are open to J1-J5 racers with a 250 minimum seed point cut-off. J4 world cup points awarded to the top 30 J4 competitors and J5 world cup points awarded to the top 30 J5 competitors in each race are used to select competitors for the Intermountain Championships. The best two slalom runs will be combined with the best two GS runs for selection purposes. Qualification for the Intermountain Championships will be based on world cup points. North and South Series Super-G's are open to J1-3 competitors and will be scored to the USSA points list. J4 competitors may race in the Super-G's but it will not be a scored race.

## Course Requirements

North Series Slalom and GS races are open to all properly licensed J1 to J5 competitors. J5 competitors cannot compete in Super G.

These races must be run on courses that meet the USSA standards for J4 and younger competitors:

<b>Discipline</b>	<b>Vertical drop</b>	<b>Gates</b>
Slalom	140 m max	32-55
Giant Slalom	300 m max	11% to 15% vm
Super G	250-350	8% to 12% vm max

vm = vertical drop in meters

For GS and Super G, only gates that require a change of direction contribute to the minimum gate count.

The North/South Series Super Gs are open to all J1 to J4 class competitors who are properly licensed. J1's, J2's and J3's will be seeded on USSA points.

*All participants in Intermountain races must be at least six years of age on December 31 of the competition season.*

## Sun Valley Invitational

The Sun Valley North race will invite the top 45 J4 boys, top 20 J4 girls, top 5 J5 boys and top 5 J5 girls from the South who have competed in the 2004-2005 season. The racers from the south and the racers from the north will compete head to head for World Cup points used for qualification to the J4 Festival. Athletes will also be able to score World Cup points at the Intermountain Championships and the Sun Valley Invitation to qualify for the J4 Festival. The Intermountain Division quota for the J4 Festival is 3M/3W.

## Entry Deadlines

The entry deadline is 72 hours before the draw.

Race organizers may refuse entries from teams and individuals that do not meet the entry deadline. When an organizer accepts a late entry, the racer may be run at the end of their age group.

## Entry Fees

Maximum entry fees for North and South Series races have been established by the ACC. For 2004-2005 these fees are:

Non-scored race	\$18.00/ race
Scored race	\$25.00/race

an additional \$10.00 training fee may be applied for Super G

Super Gs must be preceded by at least one training run.

Organizers are required to make full entry refunds to racers who are removed from the ranking board prior to the draw. Refunds for racers who are on the start order but do not start, are at the discretion of the organizer. In general, where a team has made a conscientious effort to make a correct entry, the organizer should only charge for racers who actually start. Organizers who intend not to make refunds for DNSs should indicate this in their race announcement. If an organizer does not refund the entry fees of first run DNSs, then headtax must be paid on these racers.

## Headtax

These races are subject to a \$1.00 Western Region headtax, and a \$3.00 Intermountain headtax.

## Team Captains Meetings

The organizer should schedule Team Captains at 7:30pm to allow for travel time. Teams that are unable to attend a Team Captains meeting for any reason should arrange to be represented by someone who will be at the meeting. It is the responsibility of all teams and independent racers to be aware of the decisions that are made at the meetings.

USSA rules require that all racers be represented at all Team Captains meetings. The organizer should call the roll at every meeting and exclude any unrepresented racers from training and racing.

## Start Order

All North and South J1-J5 races use TRS seeding by class for both runs.

TRS seeding involves a random draw within class for the first run. For the second run, the first run start order is reversed within each class. First run DNFs and DSQs participate in the second run in their normal start position.

J1-J3 fields in Super G will be seeded according to USSA Points.

## Trophies

A set of trophies is required for the J3 and older class, the J4 class and the J5 class. North Series races need to provide a set of trophy's for the J6 class. A set of 3 trophy's are required and a set of 5 trophy's are encouraged.

## The J4-5 Intermountain Championships

The Intermountain Championship consists of a Slalom and GS. The event will have a field of approximately 150 IMD racers. Northern division will have a quota of 15m/15w.

Racers (including out-of-division racers) may only either IMD Champs or the YSL Finale.

J4's and J5's will be selected based on world cup points earned in the North/South Series races in slalom and giant slalom. The same percentage of J4s and of J5s of each sex and from each section will be invited. The total number of Intermountain racers invited will be 150 plus approximately 10% extra for each sex, section, and class as a pad to ensure a full field. Selections will be based on the best two results in slalom and the best two results in GS and then combined into one list.

## Course Requirements

The Intermountain J4-J5 Championships races will be run on course that meet the USSA standards for J4s-J5s. These standards are:

<b>Discipline</b>	<b>vertical drop</b>	<b>gates</b>
Slalom	140 m max	32 – 55
Giant Slalom	300 m max	11% to 15% vm

vm = vertical drop in meters

In Giant Slalom, only those gates that require a change of direction contribute to the gate count.

Results must include the course name, start and finish elevations used, the vertical drop, and gate counts. For the Super G, the actual gate-to-gate length of the course, measured with a wheel or rope, must be included on the results. The Giant Slaloms will be contested in two runs.

## Entries

Invitations are issued the following week after the final qualification race of the season. Only the invited athletes may attend that event. There are no substitutions or additional selections for racers who are unable to attend the event.

Northern Division will be invited to send teams to each of the events.

## Entry Deadlines

The entry deadline is 72 hours before the first team captains meeting.

## **Entry Fees**

Organizers are required to make full entry refunds to racers who are removed from the ranking board prior to the draw. Refunds for racers who are on the start order but do not start, are at the discretion of the organizer. In general, where a team has made a conscientious effort to make a correct entry, the organizer should only charge for racers who actually start. Organizers who intend not to make refunds for DNSs should indicate this in their race announcement. If an organizer does not refund the entry fees of first run DNSs, then headtax must be paid on these racers.

## **Headtax**

The races in this event are subject to a \$2.00 Western Region headtax, and a \$5.00 Intermountain headtax.

## **Team Captains Meetings**

The organizer should schedule Team Captains meetings at 7:30 to allow for travel time. Teams that are unable to attend a Team Captains meeting for any reason should arrange to be represented by someone who will be at the meeting. It is the responsibility of all teams and independent racers to be aware of the decisions that are made at the meetings.

USSA rules require that all racers be represented at all Team Captains meetings. The organizer should call the roll at every meeting and exclude any unrepresented racers from training and racing.

## **Start Order**

The J4-J5 event uses TRS seeding by class for both runs with the J5 class starting first in both runs. First run DNFs and DSQs may participate in the second run in their normal start position.

## **Trophies**

The division supplies medals for the top five finishers in each class, and all competitors, including out of division competitors will be eligible for medals.

## **Youth Ski League Series**

The races in this series are not scored and are seeded by age groups. J4/5 (6-12 year olds) racers are eligible for YSL races. Within groups, the start order may be determined by draw. Printed results are required for these races, and the TD must complete a report; copies of which are to be sent to the Intermountain Office, the Intermountain Alpine Officials Chairman, and the Chairman of the Intermountain YSL Committee. The races are normally giant slaloms and are often duals.

## **Course Requirements**

Races in these series are open to all J4 and younger competitors and must be run on courses that meet the USSA standards for J4s and J5s. These standards are:

<b>Discipline</b>	<b>Vertical drop</b>	<b>Gates</b>
Slalom	140 m max	32 - 55
Giant Slalom	300 m max	11% to 15% vm
vm = vertical drop in meters		

The course name, start and finish elevations, vertical drop, and gate counts must be included in the results. Start and finish elevations should be determined from topographical maps or lift profiles, not with an altimeter.

Dual courses are encouraged whenever possible. The minimum spacing between dual courses is six meters with the first gates eight to ten meters from the start gates. The course format will be red course on racers left and blue course on racers right. Staggered starts are encouraged for athlete safety.

The start area for the race should be picked with consideration for the safety of the young, inexperienced racers (i.e. terrain that allows standing and the placement of equipment).

“GS type” helmets that conform to competition equipment specifications are required for all competitors in all Intermountain YSL races. Slalom helmets are not acceptable.

## **Entries**

These races are open to all J4/J5 USSA members. Participants in these races must have a USSA Alpine Student membership and an Intermountain Alpine Student license or a USSA Alpine Youth membership and an Intermountain Youth license. Competitors must be at least six years of age as of December 31 of the competition season in order to participate in any Intermountain race.

Racers from the Pebble Creek Ski Team are allowed to enter YSL races in either the North or South section.

Racers have one season in which they may participate in both YSL and North/South Series races. A racer who participates in any North/South Series events in a season is ineligible for YSL races in the following season.

Team entries should include only those racers who are expected to participate. It should not be a roster of the entire team. Entries must include name, sex, date of birth and USSA ID numbers. Teams are required to supply two parent volunteers for gate judging at each race they attend.

## **Entry Deadlines**

Entry deadlines are as specified by the organizer in the race announcement, generally 1 or 2 days before the race. Entries received after the entry deadline may be refused by the organizer or, if accepted, the late registering racers may be run at the end of their age group.

## **Entry Fees**

The maximum entry fee for these races is \$11.00 per start. Organizers are encouraged to charge entry fees only for those racers who actually start in the race, but they may charge a full or partial entry for all entered racers if they note this in the race announcement.

## **Headtax**

These races are subject to a \$1.00 Western Region headtax and a \$1.00 Intermountain headtax.

## **Coaches' Passes**

The organizer must supply comp lift passes for the licensed coaches of registered Intermountain teams (see the reference in *Elements Common to all Races*), but the organizer has no obligation to supply comp lift passes to, or to allow course access by, other individuals, including the parents of independent racers who may be acting as coaches for their children. No unlicensed individuals are allowed on course.

## **Team Captains Meetings**

Team Captains meetings may be held or dispensed with, at the discretion of the race organizer. When a formal Team Captains meeting is not held, a coaches meeting should be scheduled on the morning of the race to give the race organizer and the jury an opportunity to meet with the coaches.

## **Start Order**

These races are seeded by age groups, with the youngest group starting first. The age groups are: J6 (ages 6-8), J5 (ages 9-10), J4 (ages 11-12). These ages are based on the age of the athlete as of December 31<sup>st</sup>. Racers who are not at least six years of age by December 31<sup>st</sup> of the competition season may not participate in Intermountain races.

Within groups, start order is determined by draw or, by the order in which entries are received. Late entries, if accepted, may be run at the end of their age group.

The start order for the second run may be identical to the first run start order, or reversed in each age class, at the discretion of the organizer. First run DSQs and DNFs are included in the second run (in their normal start position). Second run start orders need not be printed if the same start order is used for both runs.

The entire girls' field is run before the boys.

In exceptional circumstances, the Jury may change the start order of the classes and/or the sexes.

## **Results**

Results should be sorted by class and should show finish position and times only. A penalty is not calculated for these races.

## **Trophies**

Prizes (first to third) will be awarded for boys and girls in each group. Organizers are strongly encouraged to provide awards for 1<sup>st</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> and ribbons for all participants.

## **The Intermountain YSL Finale**

The Finale is a two-day event consisting of Slalom and Giant Slalom races. The event is open to all YSL eligible competitors in the division, but a racer may not participate in both the YSL Championships and the Intermountain Championships.

Each team's score for the event is equal to the total of the points earned by all racers from the team in each race of the Championships, divided by the total number of racers from the team participating in the event (calculated to the nearest .01 point). A racer is deemed to have participated in the event if he/she starts in any race of the event. Racers who DNS in all races are not counted in determining the total number of racers from the team.

## **The Intermountain YSL Committee**

The Intermountain Youth Ski League Committee consists of interested individuals from programs involved in YSL racing and a representative of the Officials Committee.

The committee:

- recommends a schedule of YSL races to the ACC each year,
- prepares guidelines for organizers and TDs for these races to help them understand the requirements for hosting a YSL race and the rules under which the races are run,
- recommends rule changes or new rules for the series to the ACC, and
- provides a communication path for programs that participate in and host YSL races
